Summer Feeding Program Final Update



Mike Carpenter with grandchildren, twins Mackenzie and Mason Clanton, are all smiles on July 23 as they prepared for the final week of the Summer Feeding Program. Volunteers of all ages helped to reach more food-insecure children this summer than previously.

It seems like yesterday the Children's Summer Feeding Program started providing lunches to hungry children in Grant County, and I can still remember the two little girls who were excited to get lunch on that first day! During the summer of 2014, churches from the Grant County Ministerial Alliance volunteered, prepared, cooked, and provided lunches to children in Sheridan and Leola. We were so excited to have furnished an average of 30 meals a day, or approximately 850 lunches for that summer.

Since the program started, it has grown exponentially, and what a summer it has been this year! The last day we distributed lunches was on Friday, July 26. Again, we provided lunches this summer in Sheridan, Clearwater, Poyen, Leola, and East End. A total of 13,862 lunches were delivered at an average of 365 per day! In six years, approximately 42,000 lunches have been given to children and families with food insecurity in Grant County and East End! So many families and children rely on this program every summer!

This program continues to amaze me with all of its volunteers, donations, and support; not only from our church but from other churches and businesses in our community. On average, 20 volunteers from 13 churches and local businesses were needed each day at the four sites located in Sheridan, Poyen, Leola, and East End. It is truly a community-supported mission.

From the bottom of my heart, I want to thank each and every one of you for your continued support. We would not be as successful as we are today without each and every one of you! Please continue making your contributions throughout the year. We will be able to continue making a difference fighting against food insecurity and hunger in our community!

From the Pastor's Desk....

My how time flies, doesn't it? Wasn't it just last week that school let out for summer and all of our vacations were ahead of us? Just a few days from when you read this column, school will begin. Teachers may already be back to work! In spite of the dreadful heat and humidity that tells us that it is still very much summer, for families with children and for educators, "fall" is here!

During the year, there will be short-term studies offered. Be on the lookout as those come up. Grow in faith by learning more about who you are, who God is, and how we can be in relationship with our Creator.

I have also found that Christians rarely grow without serving God and one another. We become the people God wants us to be by focusing more upon our neighbor and less upon ourselves. Consider joining the United Methodist Women or the United Methodist Men, each of whom engage in service throughout the year. Consider teaching or helping with a children's or youth Sunday School class, with children or youth on Wednesday night, with youth on Sunday evening, or sign up to help with meals and clean-up on Wednesday nights.
